

Tree Descriptions

Sargent Crabapple grows slowly to 6'-10' tall with a 6'-12' spread that exceeds its height. Profuse clusters of small white fragrant flowers in the spring are followed by 1/3"-1/2" red berries that persist into winter. Birds love the fruit. New leaves are light green, later turning a darker green.

American Redbud grows at a medium rate to 20'-30' tall with a 30' spread. Small rosy pink spring flowers are followed by reddish-purple tinged leaves gradually change to a lustrous green in summer and a striking yellow in fall. The shiny reddish brown 2"-3" seed pods remain on the tree throughout winter.

Washington Hawthorn grows at a medium rate to 25'-30' tall with a 25' spread. White late spring flowers are followed by 1/4" glossy red fruits that stay onto the tree into winter. Leaves are reddish-purple when emerging, changing to dark green in summer, then to orange, scarlet, or purple in fall. The slender stems have thorns. This tree has a high wildlife value.

White Flowering Dogwood grows at a medium rate to 25' tall with a 25' spread. The showy white spring flowers are followed by glossy red 1/2" fruits that ripen in fall. Summer dark green leaves turn red purple in fall. This tree prefers some shade.

Japanese Dogwood grows at a slow to medium rate to 15'-25' tall with an equal spread. Showy creamy white spring flowers often turn pinkish with age. Raspberry like 1/2"-1" pink-red to red fruit ripens in late summer to fall. The shiny dark green leaves turn an intense scarlet or purplish-red to purplish-orange in fall.

Crapemyrtle grows fast to 15'-20' tall with a 6'-15' spread. The striking flowers have wrinkled petals like crepe paper in colors of white, pink, or red. They bloom from late spring to fall. The leaves in summer are dark green changing in fall to yellows, oranges, and reds. White flowered shrubs have yellow fall foliage.



2 Japanese Dogwood (<i>Cornus kousa</i>)	Light Blue
2 Crapemyrtle (<i>Lagerstroemia indica</i>)	Red
