



# Flight 93 National Memorial

THE FLIGHT 93 NATIONAL MEMORIAL is an awe-inspiring 2,200-acre national park in Shanksville, Pennsylvania. This land is a permanent tribute to the 40 passengers and crew who sacrificed their lives to save so many others on September 11, 2001.

This powerful memorial to the men and women of Flight 93—and the bravery they displayed—is on a reclaimed coal mine. It was once forested land, but years of aggressive mining have destroyed the natural beauty of the area. The memorial is restoring the historic landscape by conserving wetlands, re-establishing native habitats and treating abandoned mine discharge. In order to ensure a successful planting, many of our partners are lending their guidance and expertise. These partners include the Office of Surface Mining (Department of Interior), Pennsylvania Department and Bureau of Forestry, Appalachian Regional Reforestation Initiative, Green Forest Works and American Chestnut Foundation.

Every year during National Park Week, America's national parks host public events and coordinate volunteer opportunities to celebrate the special occasion. For a fourth year, Flight 93 National Memorial honored National Park Week with Plant a Tree at Flight 93. On April 17 and 18, more than 500 volunteers, including about 25 Enterprise employees, planted more than 20,000 native seedlings. Overall, more than 1,500 service hours were recorded for the tree planting. The trees will provide a much-needed backdrop to the Tower of Voices design feature, which will be built at the site starting next year.
