THE TREE CAMPUS JOURNEY

To become a Tree Campus, you'll need to build and implement your plan to meet the five program standards throughout the year, submit your application in the fall or winter, and celebrate your accomplishments in the spring.

Achieving Recognition

BECOME A TREE CAMPUS

Eligibility: Two- and four-year accredited colleges and universities in the United States.

- Prepare, Assemble, and Plan: Take our quick online Readiness
 Quiz to see how close your campus is to meeting the Tree
 Campus standards. Then, gather your team of students, faculty,
 staff, and community partners and start planning.
- Meet the Standards: Throughout the calendar year, work toward meeting the five core standards for Tree Campus Higher Education Recognition. Involve students in hands-on projects like tree plantings, service-learning, campus forestry research, and outreach events. Don't forget to document your work along the way!
- Submit: Applications open each fall, and campuses should submit them by their state's deadline. Document and upload activities and evidence as you go to make the application simple when the time comes.

Tree Campus Higher Education Standards

1. CAMPUS TREE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Establish a committee that includes representatives from students, faculty, facility management, and the community. This group guides treerelated decisions and fosters campuswide engagement.

2. CAMPUS TREE CARE PLAN

Develop and implement a comprehensive plan that outlines policies for planting, maintaining, and removing trees on your campus.

3. INVESTMENT

Allocate dedicated funding for the campus tree program.

4. ARBOR DAY OBSERVANCE

Celebrate Arbor Day with your campus to highlight the importance of trees.

5. SERVICE-LEARNING PROJECT

Engage students in a hands-on project that connects them with the campus or local community through tree-related activities
